

Help children dress the dolls in "special clothes." You don't have to have fancy doll clothes to do this—just look for one special thing about each piece of clothing, such as "this one is yellow" and "that one has snaps." Encourage children to look for special things about the dolls as well. Remind them that they're each special to God.



Let children take turns hiding and finding special balls. Use balls that are colorful or have a special texture, such as shiny or bumpy—whatever you have in your room. Have children close their eyes while you hide the ball. Give them clues to find each ball, such as "I see something special. It's under the table and it's red." Use the finding game to remind children that they're special to God, and God will always find them no matter where they are.





You'll need the *Play-n-Worship* DVD, a DVD player, and a television. Play "How Wide?" and have kids follow the actions on-screen. Then give each child two sheets of different-colored construction paper. Play "How Wide" again. Have children wave their papers up and down and back and forth along with the music. Notice the different ways each child moves. Point out that we're all different, but each child is special to God.



Have children sit in a circle. Say: Today in our Bible story, Joseph's brothers put him in a deep hole. But Joseph was special to God, and God took care of him and helped him out. Let's play a game to remind us about that.

Invite one child to stand in the "hole" (center of the circle). Sing to the tune of "The Farmer in the Dell":

[Name of child]'s in the hole, [Name of child]'s in the hole.

Hi-ho, the derry-o!

[Name of child]'s in the hole.

Choose another child to help the first child out by trading places. It's okay if several children want to stand together in the center.

When all the children have had a turn, have everyone return to the circle, join hands, walk around, and sing:

No one's in the hole, No one's in the hole. Hip, hip, hurray! God saved the day! No one's in the hole!



Fill a dishpan with beans or dried pasta. Set a few empty plastic containers in the beans for children to

dump and fill. As they play with the materials, explain that when Joseph went to Egypt, he had a special job—he had to make sure everyone had enough food to eat. Talk about special jobs children might have at home, such as setting the table or picking up toys. Remind children that they're special to God.
